

We note that the Burns-Budlong scholarships named after long time instructors Michael Burns and Jim Budlong were awarded for the first time this year.



Making a Seat at the Table: Women Transform Woodworking opened at The Center for Art in Wood in Philadelphia on October 4th. That evening, a record-breaking 1,300 viewers came through the Center's doors within a span of four hours!

According to The Krenov Foundation board-member and co-curator Laura Mays, "The excitement and enthusiasm was palpable, everyone there knew we hit a chord and that they were part of it. Plus, it was a bonus for everyone at the reception that so many of the 43 exhibitors were able to make it to Philadelphia, including many from across the U.S. and all six from Canada."
