Dear Alumni, Friends, Fellow Woodworkers;

As the holiday season approaches, I hope you will consider <u>making a donation to The Krenov Foundation</u>. Our mission is to continue the legacy of James Krenov, a renowned woodworker and teacher. We support the art and craft of fine woodworking by awarding scholarships, supporting exhibitions, and developing an online archive of Krenov's work.

A scholarship can be the lifeline a student needs to attend the program and immerse themselves full-time in the exploration of craft and craftsmanship at The Krenov School. This year we were able to award \$62,000 to the class of 2024, providing financial support to over half the students in the nine-month program!

<u>The Krenov Foundation</u> provides a variety of scholarship opportunities to woodworkers based on financial need including specialized awards for both women and BIPOC (black, indigenous, and people of color) students. Last year, we set a goal to double our

scholarship awards to help students afford the rising costs of living and housing. Thanks to your support, we were able to increase the total amount awarded in 2023 by more than 50% over last year!

In addition to scholarships, we also fund the <u>Krenov Archive</u>, a free online resource for anyone interested in learning more about Krenov's works, writings, and life. The website was recently updated and will continue to grow in the coming year.

Finally, we support exhibitions that showcase the work of contemporary woodworkers. We are currently helping to fund <u>The 40th Anniversary of The Krenov School</u>, an exhibit opening in April 2024 at the Grace Hudson Museum in Ukiah, CA.



Scott Baxendale



"I grew up in England but have called Amsterdam home for the past eight years.

I've always had an interest in woodworking but only seriously picked up the tools three years ago. It snowballed from a short course to a part-time school. Along the way I met a maker of 30 years who became a mentor as I did my best to learn between working full-time. At some point the penny dropped and I

decided this is what I wanted to pursue.

Juggling my days working as a software engineer and in the workshop wasn't enough to make the progress I wanted - I decided full time in school was the way to go. I looked at schools in England, Sweden and elsewhere but the writing of Krenov and the approach of the school really resonated with me. Naturally I was beyond excited to find out I was accepted.

I aim to build a solid technical foundation here, get a better feel for

design and, on a personal level, turn towards a lifestyle more aligned with my values.

"I'm from Los Angeles. I started woodworking 7 or 8 years ago when I needed furniture for myself but it was too expensive. I thought "I'm pretty handy, so let me try making something myself". So I made a bed as my first project and it came out beautiful, so I kept on woodworking. My family was awesome and encouraging, so I kept on working at it and started taking classes at Palomar College in San Diego.

During COVID it was hard to get product in for my dog leash business, so I decided to change my career and it ended up being the best change of my life. I thought maybe I am good enough to get a job woodworking and I lucked out and the first place I applied to offered me a job and it ended up being one of the best, I think, furniture makers in Los Angeles, Angel City woodshop.

After working there for a couple of years and taking classes at Palomar, I learned of the Krenov School through Jen Anderson, who used to go to school here. In my personal estimation, you need to know both machines and hand tools. I liked the idea of how the Krenov School marries the two and uses hand tools to finish and finesse what machines can do.

After coming to visit the Krenov school last February, I was blown away, literally moved to tears at the Midwinter show and I decided the Krenov School is where I wanted to spend my time. I had never put more effort into writing essays and I feel lucky that I was chosen to come here. Not only for the school, but this is an amazing place to live!

I am looking forward to becoming a better woodworker, because this is what I want to do for the rest of my life."


"I'm elated to be here for another round and another year of growth and discovery. I love this school so very much and all of my fellow students and instructors.
